

Chapter 3

- And he had seven hundred wives, princesses, and three hundred concubines: and his wives turned away his heart.

- The was the reason for the building of the Tower of Babel



The gods of the Universe

- Talmudic literature and the Apocrypha both list 7 Archangels – The Talmud assigns these to the 7 planets as 'guardians'
- Sun, Moon, Mercury, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Venus
 - 'Sammael' was assigned Mars
 - 'Sammael' was believed to be Satan!

The Planet Mars

- All the ancient cultures feared Mars

- Homer described 'Ares' as 'bane of mortals'
- Areopagus 'Mars Hill' seat of Judgment
- Epic of Gilgamesh blames Mars for the flood!





Scribal Error?

25 And Solomon had four thousand stalls for horses and chariots, and twelve thousand horsemen; whom he bestowed in the chariot cities, and with the king at Jerusalem.

Scribal Error?


- The number in the present passage is probably a corruption – Albert Barns
- Forty thousand is evidently an error in copying because a parallel passage, II Chronicles 9:25, indicates that Solomon had four thousand stalls of horses, a more suitable number. - Hindson/Kroll
- ...we may rest satisfied that there is a corruption in the numbers somewhere – Adam Clarke

Scribal Error Corrected?

- "Solomon had <u>four thousand</u> stalls for chariot horses..." - I Kings 4:26
- "Solomon had <u>four thousand</u> stalls for <u>horses and chariots..."</u> - II Chronicles 9:25
- Are we to assume from this 'corrected' rendering that Solomon had 1 horse per chariot!
 - Where would the horses for the 12,000 horsemen be kept?

Note: trying to 'help' God out usually causes a problem cf. Abraham & Ishmael!

Scribal Error?



Are we suggesting that we have TWO scribal errors in just 5 words!!

Preserved

The words of the LORD are pure words: as silver tried in a furnace of earth, purified seven times.

Duty of Care

- What advantage then hath the Jew? or what profit is there of circumcision?
- ² Much every way: chiefly, because that unto them were committed the oracles of God.

Romans 3:1-2

- The Talmud lists more than a dozen rules for copying the Torah
- Built-in security system!
- If even just one of these factors is lacking, it does not possess the sanctity of a Torah scroll, and is not to be used for a public Torah reading.
- The meticulous process of hand-copying a scroll takes about 2,000 hours (a full-time job for one year).
- Throughout the centuries, Jewish scribes have adhered to the following guidelines:

- 1. The parchment must be made from the skin of a clean animal (clean meaning ceremonially clean according to the Old Testament sanitary laws); must be prepared by a Jew only, and the skins must be fastened together by strings taken from clean animals.
- 2. Each column must have no less than fortyeight, nor more than sixty lines.
- 3. The entire copy must be first lined.

- 4. A Torah Scroll is disqualified if even a single letter is added.
- 5. A Torah Scroll is disqualified if even a single letter is deleted.
- 6. The scribe must be a learned, pious Jew, who has undergone special training and certification.
- 7. All materials (parchment, ink, quill) must conform to strict specifications, and be prepared specifically for the purpose of writing a Torah Scroll.

- 8. The scribe may not write even one letter into a Torah Scroll by heart. Rather, he must have a second, kosher scroll opened before him at all times.
- 9. The scribe must pronounce every word out loud before copying it from the correct text.
- 10.Every letter must have sufficient white space surrounding it. If one letter touched another in any spot, it invalidates the entire scroll.

- 11. If a single letter was so marred that it cannot be read at all, or resembles another letter (whether the defect is in the writing, or is due to a hole, tear or smudge), this invalidates the entire scroll.
- 12. Each letter must be sufficiently legible so that even an ordinary schoolchild could distinguish it from other, similar letters.
- 13. The scribe must put precise space between words, so that one word will not look like two words, or two words look like one word.

- 14. The scribe must not alter the design of the sections, and must conform to particular linelengths and paragraph configurations.
- 15. The ink must be of no other color than black, and it must be prepared according to a special recipe.
- 16. He must reverently wipe his pen each time before writing the word for "God" (Elohim), and he must wash his whole body before writing the name "Jehovah" (LORD in KJV), lest the Holy Name be contaminated.

- 17. Each Hebrew letter has a numerical value; each column when completed must be added up and be the exact numerical value as the scroll you were copying from.
- 18. Each page must also add up numerically
- 19. The revision (to correct any errors) of a roll must be made within thirty days after the work was finished; otherwise it was worthless.
- 20. One mistake on a sheet condemned the entire sheet. If three mistakes were found on any page, the entire manuscript was condemned.

- Critics favourite challenge:
 - "you can't trust the Bible, it's been changed so many times"
- 304,805 letters in the Torah
- How many errors in 1900 years?

Preserved

"The fact is, that after all the trials and tribulations, communal dislocations and persecutions, only the Yemenite Torah scrolls contain any difference from the rest of world Jewry. For hundreds of years, the Yemenite community was not part of the global checking system, and a total of nine letter-differences are found in their scrolls.

These are all spelling differences. In no case do they change the meaning of the word."

2 Chronicles 9:25

- Kings gives the total no. of stalls for the horses
- Chronicles gives the no. of <u>combined stalls</u> that were able to accommodate <u>horses AND chariots</u>

- As an aside, 40,000 stalls for the kings horses is by no means improbable
- The Philistines in the war of Michmash put into the field the incredible number of 30,000 chariots and 6,000 horsemen,

- 1 Sam 13:5; 14:20

26 And Solomon gathered together chariots and horsemen: and he had a thousand and four hundred chariots, and twelve thousand horsemen, whom he bestowed in the cities for chariots, and with the king at Jerusalem.

1 Kings 10:26

- 1,400 Chariots
- 12,000 Horsemen

14 And Solomon gathered chariots and horsemen: and he had a thousand and four hundred chariots, and twelve thousand horsemen, which he placed in the chariot cities, and with the king at Jerusalem.

2 Chronicles 1:14

- 1,400 Chariots
- 12,000 Horsemen
- Spread across at least 3 locations

- If Solomon had 4 cities (inc. Jerusalem)
 - and 40,000 stalls for horses divided among them
- Each city could house 10,000 stalls for horses
 & 1000 stalls for chariots at <u>each</u> city
 - Not enough for his entire 'fleet' of 12,000 horsemen /horses and 1400 chariots at one site at one time, but enough to allow effective movement of his military
- How many horses? 12,000 + 2 per chariot = 14,800
 - It is reasonable to assume he had 'spare' horses, so to allow effective movement of his military, more stalls than horses/chariots required





- If there were one horse on reserve (a spare) per every horse on duty, that would already be 29,600 horses. Hence, 40,000 stalls would have been a reasonable number to accommodate this many horses.
- Chariots of that era would typically be pulled by four horses
- "For a country to gain her ends by force she must be strong. For a country to gain her ends by diplomacy she must be twice as strong". Adolf Hitler, Mein Kampf

Solomon's Stables



Solomon's Stables

- Megiddo's foremost mission in the Israelite period was to train horses for battle.
- It's said in First Kings chapter 9, verse 15, that Solomon built the cities of Hatzor, Gezer and Megiddo, these may well have been used as chariot cities.

- One final thought...
- Solomon may have used 10 horses per chariot
- Thus if 1400 chariots...
- 14000 horses to pull them...
- + 12,000 Horsemen
- = 26,000 horses needed (excluding 'spares')
- This may account for the exact multiple of Stalls for horses being 10x that for chariots!?



28 Barley also and straw for the horses and dromedaries brought they unto the place where the officers were, every man according to his charge.

29 And God gave Solomon wisdom and understanding exceeding much, and largeness of heart, even as the sand that is on the sea shore.

1 Kings 4:28-29

"Largeness of heart" is from a Hebrew term meaning *breadth of mind*. His understanding was vast; today he might be described as a man of encyclopedic knowledge" – Chuck Missler

30 And Solomon's wisdom excelled the wisdom of all the children of the east country, and all the wisdom of Egypt.

31 For he was wiser than all men; than Ethan the Ezrabite, and Heman, and Chalcol, and Darda, the sons of Mahol: and his fame was in all nations round about.
